### **Summer Birthday celebrations at Middleton Hall**



More than 70 displaced individuals and families joined with members of Lichfield District City of Sanctuary on Saturday, 17<sup>th</sup> August to celebrate the fifth birthday of the charity. The party took place at Middleton Hall, Tamworth thanks to the trustees and the volunteer and outreach coordinator of the Middleton Hall trust. Volunteers provided craft workshops, lawn games and tours of the Hall and the stunning gardens. Guests brought their own picnics which were shared outside, preceding the now traditional multilingual and multicultural rounders game.

City of Sanctuary welcomes refugees and other newcomers to the district of Lichfield, helping them to settle in, to find the basics for living here and supporting them in working towards employment at their own level of skills and qualifications. The charity is supported by Lichfield City and Burntwood Town Councils, the Community Foundation for Staffordshire and Shropshire, Support Staffs and other local charities and individuals. We now have over a hundred members enjoying each other's friendship and support. Plans for future events include local community events and trips. The day out at Middleton Hall showed us how the recent riots, disturbances and threats of violence, shocking as they have been to us, do not in any way reflect the genuine kindness and welcome of Lichfield's residents.

A landmark event in the Sheriff's year of office is the annual Sheriff's Ride, which was due to take place as I write this, on September 7th.

This unique event began in 1553, after Queen Mary gave Lichfield a Royal Charter separating it from Staffordshire and making it a county in its own right, thereby enabling the City to appoint its own Sheriff, and is the only one of it's kind to take place annually in UK.



# Nigel Gann, Secretary and founder member of LDCOS, shares his comments and experiences of the last few months LDCoS activities/achievements.

Hatred, riots - and different types of ignorance: what is the role of the community when 'unity' goes missing?

When Cathy and I first came to Lichfield – only seven years ago – if we remarked in passing on the lack of diversity in Lichfield faces, or the predominance of men in positions of power, we were told "This is Lichfield". Things seem to have changed dramatically in that seven years. There is plenty of diversity now and we had a woman mayor last year, a woman sheriff this year and there will be a woman mayor next year. All three, not entirely coincidentally, are members of Lichfield District's City of Sanctuary.

We are not immune to recent 'movements' across the country. While most of us experienced a pretty peaceful time, riots in Tamworth and Stoke-on-Trent threatened the safety of displaced people, people of colour and those who would protect them. A number of our own members and others were locking themselves in their homes or not going out. The news broadcasts alarmed many of us, especially those who thought they might be targets.

A good time for local politicians and media to send out messages of support and comfort, you'd think. That wasn't obvious. We at City of Sanctuary sent around some "Keep Safe" advice put together by national organisations, for which many of you thanked us. But we got a warning directly from the police about the possibility of incidents being planned for the city centre and at the mosque and, when we passed it on to those who might be affected, we found ourselves pilloried by local councillors and the press for 'inflaming' the situation.

Well, you don't have to believe all you read. While Lichfield Live is often a very valuable source of local news, it can be susceptible to publishing anything that comes to hand. Indeed, we have seen several examples of misinformation from Lichfield Live and the Express and Star the very week I am writing this.

As we often experience, a lie can be halfway around the world before the truth has got its boots on – and a truth can still be lying in bed, while the lie marches around the market square. So you may have missed some of the great things that are happening in our usually very welcoming city and district.


In early July we received a further grant of slightly under £10k from the Community Foundation of Staffordshire. The donors were very impressed with the development work we have been doing alongside the substantial Ukrainian community. We will develop the essential Art Therapy classes for war-affected children, organise trips and days out for all our guests, help to develop the Ukrainian choir that gave such a moving concert at The Hub last Christmas, and will go on supporting the Ukrainian community, with support from Lichfield Arts and Transition Lichfield, to raise money for books for Ukrainian children.

Our second Summer Day's Out was held at Middleton Hall - see elsewhere for an account of that.

Communities don't develop by chance. You can't just dump an estate of two hundred plus houses on the edge of the city and expect those residents to develop a sense of being Lichfeldian. A playground and a sports field don't cut it. You need people to grow a sense of community with 'unity'.

By October we should have a Community Coordinator in post – if only for one day a week for one year. Alongside our indispensable but voluntary Administrative Officer (your editor), the postholder will help to take some of the essential organisational tasks off the (somewhat ageing) leadership! We will need to do some serious fundraising to be able to run this post on into future years.

We have a growing – and noticeably younger – voluntary team organising events and coming up with important projects. Many of them have lived experience of seeking refuge here. We go from strength to strength. Thank you to all of you, however small your contribution is. We now have over a hundred members. Thank you and bless you all!!!
