Stalls will display and offer for sale, crafts, goods and services, including jewellery, wood carving, ornaments, tailoring, books, paintings, photographs, food, language classes, volunteer recruitment opportunities, and so much more!

There will also be activities and performances throughout the day, many of which will take place on the main stage, including the LDCoS-funded Ukranian choir, superbly led by distinguished and ever-enthusiastic musician Cathy Lamb, dramatic performances, multi-lingual story-telling, artists at work, advice from experts and professionals, and so much more!

Members of the public, representatives of local business es, professional organisations, community services and local council members, will be invited to visit, to share in , and to benefit from this showcase of the culture and largely hidden skills with which we are so richly endowed in Lichfield.

Sanctuary



Sanctuary, a powerful new musical from the Red Ladder Company, premiered at The Hub Lichfield during October. This production sought to explore the issues of safety and sanctuary, and asked the question: "Do we want safety and freedom for only ourselves, or for us all?" I am delighted to report that we had our very own cultural attaché (Janet Crews) at this event, who very kindly submitted the following review to the editor to share with fellow members.

'This was an excellent and poignant telling of the story of an Iranian refugee who sought sanctuary at St Mary's Church. Alland, a campaigning journalist, was forced to flee his own country following involvement in protests for women's rights. He feared imprisonment, torture and death, and for his own family's safety, but his asylum claim had been rejected and he faced possible deportation, hence his request for sanctuary. The vicar was sympathetic, but the Church hierarchy was not, thus followed a battle between Christian and humanitarian values, rule of law and propriety, powerfully played out in a drama of speech and song performed against the impressive backdrop of St Mary's stained glass church window. This production explored the role of the church and Christian values, and when it is right to defy the law in order to uphold human rights, whilst movingly conveying the hopes and fears of the displaced, and the traumatic effect of immigration on those already vulnerable and frightened. It also addressed emotive questions "What does it mean to be British?" "Who should be allowed into the country?" Big questions, with no easy right/wrong answers, but powerfully and sensitively explored by this production. Well done, a great show!"

Director Cheryl Martin said: "Sanctuary comes at a critical moment in the conversation about immigration, refugees and asylum seekers. I hope this musical helps open up this conversation because it's one that goes to the heart of who we are and the kind of society we want to live in."

Sanctuary co-writer Sarah Woods said "A lot of people who come to the UK seeking asylum are here because they've stood up against oppression, doing things that many of us might not have the strength to do. We can learn a lot from them and the stories they share with us. Boff Whalley (co-writer) and I have been collaborating for a number of years, including co-creating work with people seeking refuge and asylum and this is a story that we both feel needed to be told."

Thank you Janet for an excellent review, and thank you Red Ladder Company for addressing this very difficult issue.

Action Group update/report

'Community as a Superpower'

In a change to the normal format, the Trustees' and Action Group's New Year was launched on 13th January, with a collaborative 'openforum' meeting entitled 'Community as a Superpower', to which trustees and other members were invited.

After receiving a warm welcome, attendees were invited to break into groups to consider the following topics -

- What makes a bad/unsuccessful community.
- Appreciate/celebrate what we do @ Lichfield District City of Sanctuary.
- Desire what might/should we do/be doing.
- Design what do we need to do.

All of the extremely pertinent points made during this session were relevant to the future of LDCoS, and further enlightening responses continue to be received from volunteers, all of which are greatly appreciated, and will truly help us to achieve the essential core goals which we now consider to be a priority for 2025 - and indeed moving forward thereafter.

In the meantime, it is entirely thanks to the passion and commitment of volunteers/members that the following forthcoming events/ developments have been made possible, all of which indeed demonstrate our commitment to making this city a truly landmark 'community superpower'.

- 1. **Bringing families together:** As previously lauded in this newsletter, 8th February saw the launch of the Ukrainian book initiative @ Lichfield Garrick theatre, during which families from the Ukraine community will be invited to meet each Saturday between 12.00 2.00pm in the Garrick Theatre Café to read, socialise and to enjoy quality time with other Ukrainian families and indeed the local commuity. The bookcase, funded by LDCoS, and kindly housed by the Garrick, will eventually be filled with books for adults and children in Ukrainian and in English, and it is hoped that this will be an important and enjoyable social hub for friends and families.
- 2. **Asking refugees about their needs:** There will shortly be a consultation evening with our guests from Ukraine to ensure that funding bids which we make on their behalf continue to truly meet their articulated needs and wants. A further update will be provided when this has been confirmed, and members will be invited to attend and support this important event.
- 3. "Look Who's Here": As detailed elsewhere in this newsletter, this exciting event is due to take place @ Lichfield Garrick theatre on 13th April 2025, with refugees, migrants and other residents invited to display their skills, talents and experience in a celebratory landmark showcase which is set to take place across the theatre including the main stage ! between 11:00 and 3:30 pm. Local dignitaries, employers, organisations and council officers/members will be invited to embrace and celebrate the richness and diversity of Lichfield culture, with interactive events including stalls of goods and food, performances of music and dance, and demonstrations of skills and crafts to be offered. This is event has been made possible by the supportive and indeed enthusiastic collaboration of the Garrick theatre, and it is sincerely hoped that all who attend will feel proud and fortunate to number these wonderful people amongst our community.
- 4. **Our Administrative Officer:** By mutual consent, community coordinator, Abigail Parkes, has now regretfully moved on, but happily she remains a committed member, so we shall continue to see her around. Following Abi's departure, we are pleased to advise that Rosemary, our longstanding treasurer and book-keeper, has agreed to take on extra responsibilities as our new Administrative Officer. Her paid contract will continue until October and possibly beyond, dependent on funding.

This is an important period of change at the charity, as founder members stand back, and new volunteers and paid workers come forward. Much of this will be formulated and agreed at our Annual General Meeting, scheduled to take place on the Saturday of Refugee Week: 21st June (venue to be confirmed). We invite you to explore what historian Simon Schama describes as "the gift of immigration, the gift of lots of different cultures".


