September focus on LDCoS Community Co-ordinator

We are, in this autumnal newsletter, delighted and excited to introduce to you LDCoS's newest - and already most invaluable - recruit Ira Shchetynina. Ira joined the LDCoS team during July 2025 following success in the selection process for this important and pivotal post of Community Co-ordinator. As a displaced person herself, and long term advocate for community resilience, sustainability, and social justice, Ira appreciates and warmly supports LDCoS's passionate commitment to promote equality, inclusivity and diversity in the public space, providing activities to foster understanding between people from diverse backgrounds and to deepen relationships between the host community, refugees and asylum seekers, and other marginalised people.

Ira's appointment has come at a time of great and exciting challenge and advancement for LDCoS, following the success of the charity's Community Foundation Funding application earlier this year. Ira will now spearhead the management of the vital projects which this funding has made possible, the structure of each of which was based on needs voiced by our members, and which met perfectly with the requirements of the funding panel. These projects will focus on 1:1 Language tuition, group English classes, speaking club, bespoke1:1 sessions covering specific life needs, language familiarisation, immersion days in everyday life situations and locations, supplementary school for children, and library family sessions.

Ira has indeed hit the ground running, and in a very short space of time, she has made enormous strides in establishment and indeed commencement of these vital projects. She has regularly volunteered as a translator at the Job Centre, hospitals, and public events, has helped organise several local activities, fundraising stalls at the Lichfield Food Festival, and seasonal celebrations, and has a deep understanding of the needs and challenges faced by newly arrived migrants.

This life experience, alongside her skills in project management, event planning, volunteer coordination, and communications, make her ideally suited to lead these initiatives, and to identify and engage beneficiaries from Ukrainian, Afghan, and Hong Kong Chinese communities. Her background as a professional translator will also ensure that communication with participants is accessible and culturally sensitive.

Ira will be ably assisted in her mammoth task by a team of skilled recruits, not least of which is of course Neil Kemp (right), who will continue to provide tuition, on a one-to-one and group basis, in language and life skills. Neil has achieved enormous success during his period as ESOL tutor and mentor, with many of his students successfully gaining employment and subsequent career advancement.

As previously reported, back in January 2024, LDCoS started working with the Ukrainian community and Staffordshire Libraries to get a stock of Ukrainian books available to the growing community here in Lichfield, and in collaboration with the Garrick theatre, who very kindly offered space for these books to be displayed and enjoyed by Ukrainian families, this wonderful project came to fruition, and was launched with an inaugural family event on 08th February 2025 in the café area at the Garrick, hosted by Luba Rodionova. Luba will continue to co-ordinate and develop this initiative via regular family sessions following receipt of this additional funding.

Staying Safe amidst Far Right violence

August 2024

Information for people fearful of or at risk of being directly targeted by far-right violence.

You have the right to be in and feel safe in your local community. You also have the right to carry out your usual, daily activities. No one has the right to treat you badly because of who you are or who they think you are, but at this time you might want to take precautions if you feel unsafe. We made some recommendations if you would like to think about additional safety measures if you feel these are necessary, and help in identifying places where you can find support and solidarity.

- Ask trusted people in your community about any recent risks. This could include whether there have been any local attacks or threats. This will help you to make good decisions about where it is safe and which places to avoid at certain times.
- Think about whether it might be better to go out with someone else, not alone where possible.
- Keep your phone charged or carry a charger with you, and make sure you have important numbers saved.
- It is a good idea to let people know where you are going and what time you expect to return, so that

- they can check in with you or let someone know if they are not able to reach you.
- People in your local community may not be well informed, and a time of heightened far-right activity and violence, may be mistrustful of large groups of people. Large groups may also draw unwanted attention from both people with hostile intentions and from any authorities who are present. Make an assessment of whether it is safe for you to meet in a large group at this time.
- Stay connected to your community. Being connected to others is good for us in lots of ways and it is helpful to know that there are many places in your community which are thinking about and prioritising your safety. If you know of a group or charity that gives information, briefings, wellbeing sessions etc contact them and ask how you can join in. If you don't know, ask others, and look out for posters, notices etc. These can be good ways of getting information on all kinds of things and a good way to stay informed and safe.

If you are scared about an urgent risk, or if you have information to share, call 999 in an emergency or if you are concerned or in doubt, call 101 for non-emergencies.

LDCoS have, at a local level, listened to the fears and experiences of members and their families, and as a result, a meeting was held on 3rd September, to discuss the increasing incidence of hate-related crime to which local councillors and LDCoS members were invited. This event, attended by 5 local councillors as well as members, offered a visible and heartening display of solidarity, and a frank discussion ensued about the rising tide of racism within our city, with personal accounts of abuse. LDCoS will pursue further collaboration of this nature within the community, and in the meantime, Nigel Gann offers his insights post-meeting in his column at the end of this newsletter.

Dear members

With CFF project work, and hate-related concerns covered separately in this issue, I will in this update concentrate on two additional issues which were discussed during the recent Action Group meeting, namely -

Faith Places of Sanctuary

An inter-faith meeting has now been held, with each of the 6 places of worship represented. The importance of said representation and maintaining contacts was emphasised, with unanimous recognition that becoming a faith place is not an end in itself, it is an ongoing commitment. It was agreed that this shared forum is vital in order to promote and achieve cross-faith understanding, with the mutual aspiration for twice yearly meetings. Meanwhile, during Quaker Week 27/09 – 05/10, Action Group member Michelle Gerard is hoping to arrange a social event with the local mosque. It is noted and acknowledged by the Action Group that the addition of Mosque, Wade Street and Quaker representatives to the Action Group has benefitted and enriched both group and wide membership. It is proposed that LDCoS should consider an approach to Lichfield Cathedral re becoming a Faith Place of Sanctuary.

Schools of Sanctuary

Action Group member Nathalie Smith is still pursuing SoS accreditation for Lichfield Cathedral School In the meantime, she has recounted to the group and example of recent cross-culture activity during National Refugee week —"Simple Acts" of kindness and solidarity with refugee encouraged via dance, poetry, art etc, using Tove Jansson's first Moomin story, "The Moomins and the Great Flood" to promote themes of courage, hope, and belonging. Members of the Action Group will further explore how best to approach other local schools re SoS accreditation. In this respect, National Schools of Sanctuary have offered much support and reassurance recently, in the light of activist misrepresentation of SoS work which has, as a result, placed schools and staff at risk. I set below the suggested website statement offered by National SoS, which I believe encapsulates all that SoS truly stands for -

'Being recognised as a School of Sanctuary means our school has shown a clear commitment to making sure every child and family feels welcomed, safe and supported to thrive. Safeguarding is our highest priority. The Schools of Sanctuary programme is not political – it simply helps schools to understand why people seek safety and to lead with kindness and humanity. We are proud to be a school where every child feels safe, where individual needs are understood, and where pupils are equipped to be kind and thoughtful members of our community.'

Last but by no means least, as per my rally cry at the top of this column, we still need you! The LDCoS Action Group always needs more members. If you think that you could offer your time and indeed input, please get in

Nigel Gann, Secretary and founder member of LDCOS, shares his comments -

"If one sees a man struggling at the bottom of a well, one's natural impulse is to pull him out. If a man is starving, one's natural impulse is to share one's food with him. Surely it is only on second thoughts that we don't do these things? Society seems to me like an organized system of second thoughts."

What a great newsletter! So many good things are happening in Lichfield, that it is difficult to understand how some people – across the country but here in Lichfield too, apparently – appear to believe that friction is better than harmony and that hate is better than love. I am sure we all believe that, while Britain is a better place than most today, our nation's history is not without blemish. So it is frustrating that people might think a country that rejects people who have, usually, a legitimate right to find sanctuary here, is better than a country that will proclaim the historic values we mostly treasure, of engagement, of a place of safety, of hospitality and welcome.

"Over 12 million people in England, over a quarter of the population, volunteer to help others at least once a month a very large section of the British population are still determined to help, and within that group, a number are drawn to help refugees" (We Came by Sea: Stories of a greater Britain, by Horatio Clare – a wonderful book to read if you despair of our country!).

Twenty-six members, including five local councillors, with a few guests, met on the 3rd September to talk about 'Keeping Lichfield Safe for Everyone'. The stories of abuse and discriminatory treatment in our own city and district distressed (and I think surprised) us all. Only a few days later, our friends at the mosque suffered an incursion by two possibly drunken young men set on displaying union flags there as if, somehow, people of the books many of us share as the basis for our faith – christians, jews and muslims among many others – are less 'patriotic' than unhappy (mainly) men who prefer hate to love.

What we all share is that this is *our* town, *our* city, *our* district and all the places of worship here are *our* churches, mosques, temples and halls.

The new forum will meet again in November. In the meantime, the great news is that good people have joined together to reject displays of supposed 'patriotism' organised by far-right groups based in Birmingham. A revealing video shows a Lichfield man erecting flags in our city centre that he openly claims to have been given directly by 'Tommy Robinson', a convicted criminal and rabble-rouser. How we reclaim our streets from these people is a question for us all. But the local councils, the police and many groups and individuals are now working together to re-establish the real values of Lichfield – of warmth, friendship and welcome.

"'You know', says an interviewee in Horatio Clare's book: "'40,000 people coming in a year – it's not even half a football stadium! People crossing the channel in 2023 was 4 per cent of immigration, 4 per cent! You must tell this story – we are all migrants. We are a migratory species. Migration is a human right.""

As 'sleeping' chair of the feline branch of LDCoS, I have always actively sought to promote the ethics and mission statement of our charity, actively demonstrating inclusivity and tolerance towards my human servants.
