Walk of Penance

On Saturday December 2nd 2023, members of Lichfield District City of Sanctuary joined a silent "walk of penance" marking the International Day for the Abolition of Slavery, walking from the Market Square to the Cruck House, where a plaque remembers Francis Barber, and stopping at specific points on route which bear resonance with our history of slavery.

With the focus of this day being to eradicate contemporary forms of slavery, such as trafficking in persons, sexual exploitation, the worst forms of child labour, forced marriage, and the forced recruitment of children for use in armed conflict, LDCOS members walked to draw attention to the continuing use of slavery and other forms of work exploitation throughout the world and in the UK, to make penance for the part that the UK played in historical slavery that remains the basis of our wealth and the poverty of others throughout the world, and to question the nature of reparation that the wealthy nations of the first world might yet make to those countries and populations still suffering as a result of slavery.

The walk ended at Cruck House with a facilitated discussion on the topic of slavery and reparations, and all discussion outcomes were then included in a petition to the Prime Minister which it is intended will be hand delivered to No 10 Downing Street to draw attention to the issues of slavery, past and present.

Speaking on behalf of LDCOS, Nigel Gann stated "We want to say publicly that we're sorry for what happened. Most importantly, we're urging the Prime Minister Rishi Sunak to lead on starting meaningful conversations about reparations. The UK's role in slavery was a shameful period in its history — our history. It's time we started to take action to compensate people who are still suffering today because of what our country did. Black and minority ethnic people in the UK today continue to face substantial disadvantages: worse housing, worse health, worse education, greater unem-

Community Engagement, Citizenship and Employment (CECE) course 2023/24

During 2023/24 a Community Engagement, Citizenship and Employment (CECE) course has been run by tutor/LDCOS Vice Chair as part of the ESOL scheme provided through English Class Private Language School. During the 2024 autumn term, Neil concentrated on employability skills (chosen by students as their most pressing need) and covered CV writing, job applications and the importance/value of a covering letter - the effective use of which demonstrates how the applicant meets the requirements and person specification for the vacancy in question. For many weeks, students practised answering standard interview questions, with group participation, discussion and sharing of ideas/feedback actively encouraged.

During the spring term, the focus changed to community engagement skills, imparting essential knowledge and insight into life in the UK and its history using simplified language which students at both intermediate level and upper intermediate level could readily understand. Students have been encouraged to read about these subjects to each other and discuss the similarities and differences to the situation and history in their own countries.

Students have been extremely positive about this aspect of the course and say that they 'have never experienced such a course before and that it has helped them to understand the country in which they are now living'.

Ultimately, <u>the course has worked</u>. Most students who have attended have obtained some form of paid employment, either full-time or part-time, during and as a direct result of the course.

Neil will continue to teach employment and life skills to students from his home in Central Lichfield, both on a one-to-one basis and via small group sessions, and will be very happy to hear from or of anyone who would benefit from his services - places subject to availability of course.

Congratulations and grateful thanks to Neil for his wonderful ,and undoubtedly successful, work from all at LDCOS.

ESOL (English for speakers of other languages) Lessons at Wade Street Language School.

Lichfield and District City of Sanctuary continues to support the provision of ESOL lessons at Wade Street Language School, in a variety of ways. Jennie Mechti, the owner of the school works closely with LDCOS and thanks to the invaluable skills and hard work of Cathy Wood in securing vital grant funding, it has been possible to provide many students with funded lessons. ESOL tutor Gill Hollis is assisted and invaluably supported by several LDCOS members with Susan Gray, Rehana Firth and Pam Tomlinson volunteering each week, all of whom help to make lesson-times fun, but ultimately rewarding, with hard work encouraged and suitably recognised, and entry for annual Trinity College examinations presented as an achievable possibility/goal, and a valuable certification of their everimproving English language skills.



However, it is not just about learning the English language. So much of the Lichfield ESOL initiative is about making friends, learning about English culture and the diverse cultures of all students attending (this involves a lot of food!) Students come from Ukraine, Syria, Afghanistan, Turkey and Hong Kong, and are all keen to learn about Lichfield and their local surroundings. Consequently, a Cultural programme has grown up within the Language School., with strong links forged with the Cathedral and The Garrick Theatre through which the ESOL students have benefited from a range of wonderful activities: most recently, students contributed their thumbprints to the city-wide arts project 'March of The Elephants' promoted by The Garrick. Also, each year a Summer School organised by the Teaching Assistant volunteers takes students out and about around Lichfield, visiting places of historical and general interest such as Dr Johnson's House and Museum, Erasmus Darwin Museum and herb garden and Lichfield Cathedral. Last year, thanks to the provision of National Trust tickets by Shaz Umbreen, a visit to the 'Back-to-Backs' in Birmingham took place, and was enjoyed by all who attended.

Many, many thanks to Gill, and to all the members who volunteer their time and commitment towards the provision and success of the Lichfield ESOL initiative.



It is perhaps fitting that the last word should go to Pam Tomlinson, who would like to hear from any members who may wish to volunteer at the Language School as Teaching Assistants or would like to volunteer at the Summer School which takes place in August.


Migrants, both internal and external, willing and enforced, bring us so many things to treasure, new ideas, new cultures, fresh perspectives. Can you imagine a successful company or a winning sports team that doesn't encourage - and need new blood as much as it requires and values its old stalwarts?

So it is with communities, and we are proud that this message is heard in high places - the leader of Burntwood Town Council, the current mayor and the next sheriff of Lichfield are all committed members of Lichfield District City of Sanctuary. But there is much to do. The decades-long shortage of affordable housing, the focus on expensive homes for the retired and expenditure on city-centre 'amenities' continue to bedevil opportunities to develop vibrant new communities.

Our collective vision is to challenge and disprove the view that newcomers are a threat. We also deny that inward migration is a new and growing menace. Statistics show that we are among the meanest of European countries in accepting people from war zones, famine and terror. Nevertheless, the British Isles have been the final stopping place for westward-bound travellers for thousands of years. Celts, Romans, Anglo-Saxons, Scandinavians, Normans, Huguenots (one of my own origins), Jews, Irish, Africans, African-Caribbeans, South Asians, and most recently, Ukrainians and Hong Kong Chinese have contributed to our bloodlines, boosted our economy, brought new skills and inventions, and given colour to our lives.

Above all, perhaps, is the worldwide ethic of hospitality. Hostility, fed sadly by much of our government and our media, leads to fear and hatred. But hospitality - the range of hospitality provided by our community here - springs from kindness, generosity and respect. That is what City of Sanctuary displays, encourages and enables. And, of course, hospitality is much more fun than hostility!
