

## COMMUNITY

In our assembly we looked at the word COMMUNITY and thought about what it might mean...

We talked about our school community made up of teachers, governors, TAs, midday supervisors, parent and cares and of course YOU!



## A quick reminder...

We thought about the different *kinds* of communities we could belong to.

We thought about our school as a community – made up of all sorts of different people, doing all sorts of different jobs and contributing to making our school community a safe, welcoming and fun place to be.

Let's have a look...



A **community** is a group of people who have something *in common* – an interest or a place that that they share. It might be...

 Your class
 Your school
 A choir or orchestra
 A sports team

 A club like Brownies or a drama group
 Your family
 Your Neighbourhood
 Can you think of any others?

## Everyone is welcome in our school community!



It can be really hard to move school, to move to a new place and to try and join a new community.

Because it is Refugee Week and A Day of Welcome, we can take a while to think about how we can welcome new people into our communities, especially refugees.

Who are refugees?

## Who are refugees?

Refugees are ordinary people who live through extraordinary times

They are people forced to leave their country to flee danger and who cannot return or be returned to their homeland.

people on earth have been forced to flee their homes

Everyone has the right to seek and enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution

In this short animated film, he describes the sadness of separation from his family as well as his experiences adjusting to life in the UK.


Imagine if Ali joined our school...

## Where do we fit in?

Our school community belongs to a wider community. You might call it a neighbourhood, a village or even a town.





You have a map of our neighbourhood. Have a careful look with your team.

- Can you find our school?
- Can you find any other places that you recognise? Mark them too.
- Can you find your house?



Think about all the kinds of people that you know live in our community.

#### Make a list of people that you KNOW live here

For example, someone who is 100 years old, a doctor, etc


## Can you imagine any other kinds of people you don't know but who MIGHT live here

For example, someone who is a scientist, a Sikh family, a young family

Pick one place on the map – a building or a space and write together a list of all the things that happen there. Things people do together or reasons that people go there.

This park might be one example.





Take time and take turns to make a whole class list of what you have found



Community is IMPORTANT!

Being part of a community is important and it is also a **responsibility**.

We can all help to make any community that we belong to welcoming and powerful.

So what can we do?

On a new piece of paper, each group will make some very quick notes that answer the following questions.

YOU HAVE 3 MINUTES!

#### **GROUP 1**

Where are some places in our community that great things happen?

#### **GROUP 2**

Where are the places in our community that I would want to share with a newcomer?

#### **GROUP 3**

Where are the places in our community that new people really NEED to know about?

#### **GROUP 4**

What do I wish for our community?

## Time to swap!


Each group moves to a new question –

Group 1 moves to Group 2 etc.

OR you can pass papers if moving is tricky in your classroom.


You have 3 minutes to read what the people before you have written and add to it.

Do this until everyone has visited every question.



The bigger it is the more people it has each with their own talents, skills and gifts.


The more different kinds of people are included the smarter and more powerful the community becomes.


